My Experience at Pete's Place - Northern Michigan's Only Shelter for Homeless Youth

Having volunteered at several homeless shelters and transition homes in the United States, Russia, and Brazil, I was aware that each program has its differences, but the particulars often remain the same. These particulars are the size of beds offered, the lights on and lights off scheduling, and other standard protocol. The differences, however, are always the individuals. This was most certainly true of Pete's Place.

I interacted with six youth who came and went from Pete's Place throughout the summer. Whether these youth identified Pete's as a long or short term home, each of them became unique members of the Pete's Place family, and they generously accepted me into the family. This act of acceptance was no small feat for them, with many of them having experienced dysfunctional homes. Slowly but surely as the residents began to trust me with small things others might have seen as trivial, I began to see potentially invaluable steps of progression for each youth. Each of the residents had a different backstory. Some of the youth have experienced abuse, most of them suffer continuously with trauma, and all of them struggle with their own unique issues as teenagers. Whatever led these young adults to the Pete's Place doorstep, each one of them deserves to reach their highest potential.

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Pete’s staff are uniquely qualified to deal with these individual differences. At Pete’s, staff have a mission to not only provide shelter for the residents, but to also provide them the opportunity to develop skills for life on their own after Pete’s. The staff serve as role models and mentors toward the development of these skills. They converse with residents about video games, helping residents with dinner menus, and always take the time to listen. Instead of simply giving residents a place to stay short-term, youth are offered a structured environment where they can learn essential tools to face early adulthood.

Interacting with both the staff and residents I immediately noticed that the effort required to create such an environment could have been easily forgone by the staff. I volunteered two to three days a week over the course of the summer and each day when I arrived I joined a different staff member as they interacted with the residents. And each of those days I found the staff engaged in their lives and the youth were willing to let the staff be involved.

This dynamic was inspiring.

By the close of my limited time at Pete’s it became clear that the program is so much more than a shelter.

I began by saying that individuals are the difference in programs such as this. The individuals at Pete’s Place are making a remarkable difference.

Sunrise Rotary Gears Kids Up for School

Each year the Traverse Bay Sunrise Rotary Club generously supplies a new backpack full of school supplies to qualifying elementary age children in the Traverse City area with their Backpacks for Kids program. CFS is grateful to be a participant in this program and this year was able to distribute 160 backpacks to our families to start the school year off right. Backpacks for Kids began in 2004 and since its inception has donated over 19,000 backpacks, serving nearly 1,000 school children a year.

“We see this project as one small way to aid these families that are most in need of support from our community,” says Backpacks for Kids Chair Linda Raetz. On average, a fully supplied backpack costs \$20.00, requiring annual donations of \$20,000 - \$25,000. In addition to the monetary investment, volunteers donate hundreds of hours towards planning, ordering, organizing, and recruiting the many hands that help to stuff each bag. This truly is a community effort and we are so grateful to have that support for our kids and families.
